Resurrection for Planet Earth

One thing we tend to forget during our grand Easter celebrations is that Christ's resurrection was never only about individuals being given new life beyond the grave. The belief in some sort of life after death, and even bodily resurrection didn't start with Jesus. Even the belief in his bodily resurrection wasn't the whole point. The early church always saw it as something much bigger than that. Paul wrote:

... the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves who have the first fruits of the Spirit groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. [Romans 8.21-23] and He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers — all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the first born from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether in earth or in heaven by making peace through the blood of his cross. [Colossians 1.15–20]

Our resurrections, starting with Jesus' resurrection, are part of a bigger plan that God has for the whole creation. It's Jesus' resurrection that makes us think such a thing is even possible. The Bible says it has cosmic implications.

Katharine Hayhoe is director of the Climate Science Center at Texas Tech University, a professing evangelical Christian, and a frequent speaker to churches, sometimes antagonistic to her message. She says, "...climate change is real and human-caused and the impacts are serious enough to warrant taking action." She counters some of the pseudo-scientific arguments against climate change with these words:

I know that there are lots of scientific sounding objections: "it's just a natural cycle," or "scientists don't know enough yet," or "those models are always wrong." ... I also hear the religious objections: "if God is in control, then nothing bad can happen," or "God gave us dominion over the earth, so we can do whatever we want," or, "the earth is going to end anyway, so why does it matter?" ... They've been told that climate change solutions will ruin the economy; that the issue is being pushed by godless liberal atheists, and Christians can't go along with them; that the concern is a tool of the Democrats to expand big government and control people's lives. ... Here's the thing: those worries are not accurate. There are all kinds of solutions that energize local economies, build jobs, free people to develop their own energy sources, and — most importantly — fulfill our call to exercise responsible dominion over the planet and love others as Christ loved us.

Here are some facts to consider:

- 1. Climate change (or climate instability, the wording I prefer) exacerbates the problems of hunger and poverty and lack of access to clean water. The poorest of the world suffer most and can do the least about it.
- 2. Clean energy creates many more jobs than traditional fossil fuels, many of them local.

- 3. Supporting clean energy empowers us to develop our own energy rather than importing it. (The U.S. now ranks well down the list of nations that are developing their own clean energy, including lagging far behind China which had a long way to go in terms of pollution.)
- 4. Some 200,000 people in the U.S. die annually as a direct result of pollution.
- 5. There are all kinds of things that can be done by individuals like us. We know many of them: caring about and conserving our water (which we often take for granted, being almost surrounded as we are by the Great Lakes that hold a major fraction of the world's high-quality fresh water), LED bulbs, eating lower down on the food chain and more locally, insulating, recycling, joining groups for action; and these only scratch the surface.
- 6. Probably the most important thing any of us can do is talk about climate change/instability. It's all about making our choices and using our voices. Our silence makes us complicit.

We can be grateful that this church is a leader in our state when it comes to solar power and energy conservation. We'll continue to explore other options as well. We encourage any of our members to get involved with Michigan Interfaith Power and Light, the organization that enabled us to pursue solar.

Where we live, we are surrounded by issues that affect our society — poverty, racism, (hetero)-sexism, fear of the "other," misogyny, job loss, stagnant wages — and plenty more, such that there's no possibility of burying our heads in the sand around here. Yet we rarely stop to consider that they are all related, and none of them can be solved if we don't have a planet we can inhabit. Expecting God to step in and take care of everything runs counter to all we know of God and human freedom in this world. As always, we're expected to work in partnership with God, because we too love God's creation — we're a part of it, after all.

Our planet isn't dead yet, so maybe it's premature to talk about resurrection. Yet it isn't too soon to talk about life support; we are dangerously close and prefer to politicize rather than protect, preserve and empower. May God keep us faithful to our partnership and to God's grand vision of an earth renewed and filled with life.



Air Conditioning Update

Air Conditioning Project: We will be air conditioning our main sanctuary by Summer, a project that was authorized by our Administrative Council in 2016. A contractor has been selected by our Board of Trustees. We need to be able to worship in our sanctuary year round, to provide the comfort that people today expect in a public building, to be able to rent our facility all year, and to be able to host major events even in the summer. To date we have raised over \$14,700 toward the amount. The Trustees have accepted a bid and installation should begin soon. Contributions are still very welcome while the project is underway. You may choose to give regularly toward the goal or to provide one major gift; any amount is welcome! Please do not hold back; the more we raise now, the less we will have to borrow! (We voted to borrow from our own reserves in order to maintain total control over the project.)

This is a major step in the life of our congregation, so we have been hard at work preparing an apartment/hospitality room for guests. Thanks to Karen King, Kathy Arcese and Jill Warren who have put their purchasing and decorating skills to good use. Worship at Ferndale First

April begins with Easter this year, and the following Sundays of Easter give us insights on how the early church put Jesus' resurrection into perspective and into action in changed lives. Certainly, we welcome the coming of spring-like weather and new life to our world; God has even more in mind, and we'll discover it together in worship.

April 1 – Easter Worship;

8:00 a.m., Early Easter Worship, with our Youth leading much of this shorter service, especially for those who may need to be elsewhere later in the day. Message: Come On!, Mark 16.1-8.

10:30 a.m., Easter Worship Celebration, in addition to the usual resurrection scriptures of the day, we'll be inspired by a great imaginative vision from Isaiah. Message: On Our Way to God's Party, Isaiah 25.6-9, John 20.1–18. Flowers, Music, Holy Communion, Anointing with Oil.

- April 8 2nd Sunday of Easter; How are the people who follow Jesus any different from other people in society? What made those first Christians so unique that people flocked to become a part of their movement? If we get the answers, can we live with them? Message: What Makes Easter People Different? Acts 4.32–35, 1 John 1.1–2.2, Psalm 133 and John 20.19–31.
- April 15 3rd Sunday of Easter; Native American Ministries Sunday; including a special offering for Native American ministries, some in our state. The Bible is frequently misunderstood and even abused when people speak about what happens in the after-life. What about eternity and often strange subjects like judgment, hell and heaven? What about Native beliefs? Message: Another World? Acts 4.5–12, 1 John 3.16–24, John 10.11–18.
- April 22 4th Sunday of Easter; Festival of God's Creation; The resurrection of Jesus matters, not just for those who have lost loved ones or for those who face death. Jesus' resurrection matters for the entire creation. Message: A World Full of Resurrection, Luke 24.36b-48, Acts 3.12-21. As we approach Earth Day, the Bible has something important to say.
- April 29 5th Sunday of Easter; Solar Power Celebration Sunday; We'll celebrate that our solar array has been "on line" and providing solar energy for a year now. Special activities are planned. // Things happen that we can't explain. God works in mysterious ways, and often through unexpected people, like Philip and an Ethiopian he just "happens" to meet on the road. Coincidence? It's an amazing upheaval of so much that people believed. God likes to mess with our heads. Message: Raodside Revival, Acts 8.26-40 and earlier verses.

Giving and Living

As a former model, my body was a clothes hanger, an object to be dressed, painted, posed, and photographed. It was the source of discussion, as if my body wasn't also connected to my soul, my spirit, and my mind... *me*. Others demanded that I lose weight and tone my muscles, clear and tan my skin. Put simply, I was objectified.

At a certain point, I began to treat my body as an object as well. I fell into the dualistic trap of thinking my body and spirit were two separate entities. I abused my body by denying it nutrition, feeding it toxins, and allowing it to be used for the pleasure of others. I objectified myself.

Eventually, with the help of God, I realized that my body and spirit were interconnected, and that what I did to my body, I also did to my spirit. Both had been subjected to physical, mental, and spiritual harm. Gradually I discovered that the more I focused on the health and well-being of my body, the better my spirit reacted. I retired from modeling. I ate nutritious food and exercised moderately. I started counseling to restore health to my mind. I began to see both my body and spirit as a gift: a gift God had created, breathed life into, claimed, sustained, and redeemed ...

I now seek to use my eyes to see injustice, my ears to hear the cries of the oppressed, my nose to smell the freshly baked bread of Communion. I use my mouth to pray and speak up for those who have been silenced, to share a smile in solidarity, to taste and know that the Lord is good. I give thanks that I am able to use my mind to ponder and think of others. My shoulders are tear gatherers, strong enough to bear others' burdens. My arms hug, lift, build, and stretch across boundaries; my hands create, caress, and hold other hands. My hips carry myself and my daughter; my legs dance, and my feet march in protest and for peace. As a mother, I have the privilege to know how my belly and breasts carried and fed a child, even as my heart heaves and my lungs sigh deep breaths for those who have longed to know this.

Bodies are diverse and wonderful in their own way — each one a gift to be cherished and cared for, nourished and in which to take delight. And as we care for our bodies in loving acts of stewardship, we may find that our spirits come alive as well, igniting in us the passion to use our bodies to serve the world God so loves.
