Christians Vote!

Given the average age of our congregation, it's likely that by the time you read this many of us will have already voted, absentee. Nonetheless, it's still important to consider the role of our Christian faith in our voting.

People have all kinds of reasons, or excuses, for not voting. *The system is rigged. You can't trust the people running. Politics is a dirty business. My vote won't matter anyway.* There's plenty we would love to change about our political system if we could. But if we don't vote, we give in to the powers of this world that run counter to God's will. I, for one, would like to see a multi-party system similar to many other countries in the world where parties would have to join together to form coalitions in order to win elections and get things done. It seems to make more sense than a "winner take all" approach that forces people into one of only two camps that rarely cooperate, especially in these times.

This isn't new. In the early church Christians were skeptical about *any* form of cooperation with the powers of this world. Christians saw themselves as an alternative to empire and its power. They followed the politics of Jesus. In other words, what Jesus expected of his people had political implications for how one lived in the world. Of course, in the Roman Empire any notion of voting among the common people was out of the question. Thank God, times change.

When Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire under Constantine, everything changed, and Christian leaders fell all over themselves to curry favor with the power of the empire and to use that power for their own ends. The church traded passion for privilege and power. The temptation is still there to do the same today. Things change, even in churches, and not always for the better. (How else can you explain the fact that Baptists were originally pacifists?! How many pacifist Baptists do you know?)

By the time of the Reformation, starting in the 1500s, there arose the Anabaptists (not to be confused with Baptists who actually came a little later in the 1600s, unless you're a Baptist who still insists that John the Baptist was the first Baptist—with tongue-in-cheek apologies to my Baptist friends). The Anabaptists, who branched into the Mennonites, the Brethren, and even the Amish and others, once again decided that to participate in any political process was to be spiritually tainted by the world. So they dropped out, which was just another form of political action. Today many of these churches are very active in justice and peace issues, and their people vote accordingly. Times change.

In the sad history of our own country, women couldn't vote until the 1920s and legal voting among people of color was and is often actively suppressed. Political parties in certain states craft laws that make it purposely difficult for certain people to vote. The space of one brief article prevents me from writing about the actual steps taken in Ohio, North and South Carolina, Georgia, and Texas, among others, in order to make voting difficult for Black and Latinx people. Obscure voter registration laws, eliminating early voting, identification laws, closing or moving polling places that serve minorities—these are all well-documented. The absurd lengths that people in power will go to in order to keep that power is glaring in Texas, where students are seen as "a little too liberal," so student ID doesn't count at polling places—but gun registration ID does count. So: students no, gun owners yes.

Often the excuse used for such voter suppression is that it stops "voter fraud." Right. Justin Levitt, a professor at Loyola Law School in Los Angeles and a nationally recognized scholar of constitutional law, did a study of voting between

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2000 and 2014. Out of 1 billion votes cast in those years—in general, primary, special and municipal elections—he found only 31 credible allegations of potential fraud that might have been prevented by a rule requiring ID at the polls. That's 31 out of 1 billion votes. In person voter fraud is simply put, a lie. (Carol Anderson, chair of African American studies at Emory University and author of *One Person*, *No Vote: How Voter Suppression is Destroying Our Democracy.*)

No single political party has a corner on truth and goodness, of course. An honest Christian will search deeply into what the Bible, and especially the life and words of Jesus, tell us about how to live together in this world. What our faith teaches us may be inconvenient and even uncomfortable, but it's usually quite clear. The Bible is clear on the treatment of immigrants as equals. Jesus reminds us to love our neighbors and then reminds us that our neighbors are often those most unlike us. Nations will be judged by how they treat the naked, the poor, the prisoner and the broken-hearted. Like the early church, our allegiance isn't to a political party, although we may choose to align with one. Our final allegiance is to the alternative politics of Jesus, or we relinquish the name Christian. We happen to live in a place where we have the right to choose our votes in accordance with the Jesus alternative.

Fr. Richard Rohr says, "...voting is a deeply moral act for me...It is also a decisive act of Christian faith that I matter, society matters, justice matters, and others matter." One could hardly say it better than that.

Christians vote. It matters.

Worship at Ferndale First

November

November is a very special month, beginning with our Annual All Saints Memorial Service and ending with The Reign of Christ, the last Sunday of the Christian Year. In between, each Sunday has something important to offer. It's a great opportunity to invite a friend, neighbor, relative or co-worker to give FUMCF a try.

November 4 – 24th Sunday after Pentecost; Annual All Saints Memorial Service; when we remember those of our number who have died since last November 1, All Saints Day. We'll sing songs, praise God, light candles and ring chimes as we experience the strength of recalling what they have left us as their legacy. Memorials may be dedicated at this time. Message: *An All Saints Meditation*, Mark 10.2–16. *Holy Communion* and *A nointing* in memory.

November 11 – 25th Sunday after Pentecost; UMW Sunday; our United Methodist Women will take charge and plan this annual service. This year they've invited a very special guest speaker, Ruby Anderson, a leading layperson in the Michigan Area UMC. Message: *TBA*.

November 18 – 26th Sunday after Pentecost; Bible Sunday; (also Thanksgiving Sunday); the Bible is often misunderstood and sometimes actually abused when people try to make it say what they want it to say. Nowhere is that more apparent than in those who use it to predict "end times." Let's get a better understanding—of these texts and the Bible itself. Message: *Earthquakes and Labor Pains*, Mark 13.1–5 and related texts.

November 25 – 27th Sunday after Pentecost; The Reign of Christ (Christ the King); this is the last Sunday of the Christian Year and it looks forward to when Christ will be all and in all. The danger is in misunderstanding the kind of king Jesus was and is. Pilate gets the message, or does he? Message: *The King with Dusty Feet*, John 18.33–37.

Who would you like to invite to worship with you next Sunday? (65–85% of all people who attend a church for the first time come because they were invited by a friend, neighbor, co-worker or relative.)

Giving and Living

"Why do we give?" asked a 9-year-old girl... Teaching to give at a young age helps start children and youth on a path of giving that has the potential to last a lifetime. Certainly, at the young age of two or three, they will not fully understand nor appreciate the reasons why we give... What is important in teaching children and youth about stewardship is that it is a gift that we give and that God values our gifts... The telling of the Creation Story helps to model stewardship well. God has abundantly blessed us with this earth on which to live. As "stewards" of creation, it is our job to respect the earth and take care of it, as it is God's to begin with. Children and youth often understand this analogy well, as they are already exposed to the concepts of caring for creation. However, there are many other ways to teach and model stewardship through the offering of money, time, prayer, and worship—just to name a few.

Four Ways to Teach Stewardship

Money: Perhaps the easiest way to teach stewardship is through the modeling of giving. The passing of the offering plate gives children both a tactile and visual experience of learning stewardship... By physically placing the offering into the plate, givers have a deeper sense of what it means to give. Just as a child or youth witnesses their parents give, they too may feel more compelled to give. If electronic giving is desired, parents can speak to their children about that practice as well. Many congregations provide cards or wooden coins to place in the offering plate that represent electronic, automated giving.

Time: Sharing one's gifts, time, and talents are excellent ways to practice stewardship. In some situations, there are people who financially are not able to offer monetary forms of giving, but are able to give of themselves. This particularly resonates with youth. Oftentimes they do not have the means to give, but the offering of service in worship or helping around the church provides validation to their giving.

Prayer: On the same lines of non-monetary giving, prayer offers another option for stewardship. What is special and unique about prayer is that anyone can offer prayer. Prayer can be offered through music, voice, silent prayers, and meditations.

Worship: According to David Gambrell, "Worship itself is a gracious gift of God -- the gift of being able to gather in God's presence, to hear again the gospel of Jesus Christ, to share in communion of the Holy Spirit, and to be sent to love and serve the Lord in daily life." This too is another form of stewardship in which all people can participate and that pleases God...It's important to take note that starting with small practices and explanations, at any age, is more beneficial than avoiding stewardship practices altogether. As children age, they begin to grasp why we give and personalize their own giving. As with adults, stewardship is something very personal between the giver and God. It is in the giving of time, money, prayer and

worship that we receive God's unconditional love.

Due to recent help with rent and utility bills, we are temporarily unable to offer assistance. Thank you for your generous support so often in the past. We will resume soon, no doubt.
