

One ... and Then Easter

Several weeks ago in a sermon I quoted T. Denise Anderson, a Presbyterian minister and African-American justice advocate. She said, "As a minister who works to cultivate racial justice in the church and the world, the most frequent pushback I receive involves questions about forgiveness and 'not harping on the past.' She continues, "It remains for me the saddest of ironies that so many Christians would see someone else die in their pain rather than die to their own indifference or their need to feel secure in the world's rightness."

It's another way of saying we'd rather not be disturbed when we've got things mostly the way we like them. Or as we've heard in so many sermons, we'd like to jump past Good Friday and go directly to Easter. But real life is messy, sometimes painful, and even costly if we're trying to follow Jesus. And sometimes it can feel lonely, too. Last month I mentioned Jesus walking that lonesome valley by himself. One person. Alone. There will be times that feel like that if we're attempting to live faithfully and not just comfortably. I hope not many.

This Lent I'm reminded of how the Pharisees and Sadducees, two groups that didn't particularly like or trust each other, banded together to get rid of Jesus because he threatened their way of life, their control over their people. In John 11.50, Caiaphas, the high priest, says to a gathering of these enemies of Jesus, "You do not understand that it is better for you to have one man die for the people than to have the whole nation destroyed." Better to sacrifice one individual than to lose our grip, than to lose what we have. It's for the good of the majority. And us.

We'd like to think the majority rules — at the ballot box, in church, wherever we have a stake. And then we remember that Jesus told stories about God. God is like a shepherd who will risk the entire flock to go out after one lost and wandering sheep. God is like a silly, poor woman who loses a coin and turns the whole house upside down looking for it. Then when she finds it she throws a party that costs way more than the coin is worth. And speaking of worth, Jesus then tells a story about a worthless son who squanders his inheritance then finally comes to his senses, penniless and hungry, and decides to come home because he knows his father. And Dad throws a feast for him, the one who caused so much trouble and worry. The good, stay-at-home-and-keep-his-nose-clean son is furious. Everything he's ever thought about fairness is undone. Sometimes what the majority thinks is comfortable — and wrong.

So Jesus has to go to the cross. The Roman authorities can't let him live, just in case his followers might get out of hand. The powers that be of his own people know he has to go. You can't let someone like that shake what's been built. And Jesus knows it. The reality of it all hits him full on when he prays in the garden, "if it's possible let this cup pass from me." If there's any other way, God.

And he goes to the cross alone. One man. One death. In fact, it really was for the nation — and the world and the universe and the church. And all of us.

We'd love to be certain...about every decision and choice.

Worship at Ferndale First

April

Spring has arrived and we're fast approaching Easter. There are signs of new life all around us, and coming together to worship is one of the best ways to awaken to new beginnings. Easter joy awaits, even out of pain and loss. God is here and Jesus lives.

- **April 7 5th Sunday in Lent;** Rev. Bob Porter will be bringing our message and officiating at a service of *Holy Communion* while Pastor is taking a Sunday to rest. We're grateful to have several who are willing and able to be guest speakers, and we look forward to what God gives Bob to bring to us.
- **April 14 Palm/Passion Sunday;** there are so many truths in these texts on the Palm Sunday parade and the Passion that followed. Yet sometimes we miss the very radical nature of what Jesus was saying and doing. Message: *A Parade with God's Permit,* Luke 22 and 23, selections. Kids Club Choir and Chancel Choir singing.
- **April 18 Holy Thursday;** Prayer Vigil (come and go for quiet reflection and prayer; helpful guides available) from 5:00–6:45 p.m. here at FUMCF. At 6:45 p.m. we will gather here for an outdoor processional up Woodward to Zion Lutheran, followed by a 7:00 p.m. combined service at Zion Lutheran next door, including both choirs, a combined message from both pastors and *Holy Communion/Lord's Supper*.
- April 19 Good Friday; noon; a half-hour of meditative organ music followed by a half-hour service of hymns and spoken word from Rev. Matthew Bode of Zion Lutheran, here at FUMCF.
 7:00 p.m., a combined service with Zion Lutheran and possibly other congregations, hosted by Zion Lutheran this year. Rev. Bob will bring a spoken meditation.

April 21 – Easter Services:

Early Service at FUMCF, 8:00 a.m., ideal for those with other obligations later in the day; with youth and children participating

Easter Breakfast, 9:00 a.m., Fellowship Hall, a pot luck brunch with details to be announced

Easter Celebration Service, FUMCF, 10:30 a.m., Sanctuary, with Easter music, the *Reception of New Members*, *Holy Communion* and *Anointing*.

April 28 – 2nd Sunday of Easter; not so very long after the resurrection of Jesus his followers began a new kind of life, far different from the lives of fear, self-centeredness and uncertainty they'd lived before. Following Jesus can bring new life and new actions too. It doesn't necessarily come without courage. Message: Over the Line, Acts 5.27–32; John 20.19–31.






You can sign up in the Coffee Hour Calendar which is kept on the table by the offices during the week. On Sundays the calendar is in the Social Hall.

Giving and Living

(Commenting on John 12.1–8:) (Mary) anoints the feet of Jesus with a very expensive perfume—the equivalent of a year's wages for the average worker—and then wipes his feet with her hair. (Judas) criticizes Mary's action as an unnecessary waste of what could have been put to better use feeding the poor ... Judas is right: what Mary has done seems senseless in a world of so much need.

Yet Jesus reprimands Judas, telling him ... Mary is justified in her apparent waste not because the poor are not important, but rather because she takes a unique opportunity to express her overwhelming gratitude and love for her master...

The truth is that quite often we are more like Martha or even like Judas. In the midst of a pragmatic society, we wish to be efficient, to make certain that everything counts and that there is no waste. In the church we look for responsible budgets that make the best possible use of every cent. This is a requirement of responsible stewardship. However, for this to be true Christian stewardship it must be founded not primarily on efficiency but on an overwhelming love that leads to what others may consider mere waste.


We are preparing to celebrate Easter and the events surrounding it. It is a difficult time to be celebrating anything. There are millions of refugees ... who live in miserable conditions, who sometimes do not even have enough to eat ... We have turned politics into a cutthroat game in which the purpose is not to serve the needs of as many as possible but rather to amass as much power as one can while excluding those seen as "others." ... all sorts of interests are involved in a runaway race to see who can gain the largest margins of profit, even at the cost of destroying the environment.

... How can we spend resources and energy preparing choirs to perform beautiful music, embellishing our church buildings, buying Easter lilies, sending greetings to others, and organizing pageants? ... If the church has beautiful music, attractive decorations, and well-designed pageants, perhaps more people will come and offerings will rise. All of this may be true. It may even be proper. But this is not the reason for our joyful celebrations and extravagant actions.

... Mary spills her perfume with wild abandon for no other reason that this: Jesus is there. There is no calculation here, no consideration for efficiency, no sense that this is a waste. There is nothing but sheer love and gratitude for what Jesus has done.

This does not mean that the poor are not important. On the contrary, Jesus establishes a parallel between himself and the poor. Now he is present, and Mary rightly feels the need to be extravagant. When he is no longer present in the flesh, the poor will still be there—to be served with the same extravagance.
