

The View From Here monthly reflections from Rev. Bob MLK Needed Today

Annually, from the MLK Holiday through the end of Black History Month in February I spend time reading in the writings, sermons and speeches of Martin Luther King, Jr. I've come to believe he was arguably the greatest Christian leader of the 20th century, at least in the U. S. if not for most of the world. As I said Sunday, it's not what he chose for himself. God called him to it in spite of his initial reluctance, and he changed history. His wisdom and passion for justice are needed as much today as they were in 1957 when he proclaimed, *Give Us the Ballot* at a prayer rally in Washington D.C. Here is just a small portion of that speech (with a disclaimer for the non-inclusive language that was common in his times):

... There is something in our Christian faith, at the center of it, which says to us that Good Friday may occupy the throne for a day, but ultimately it must give way to the triumphant beat of the drums of Easter. There is something in our faith that says evil may so shape events, that Caesar will occupy the palace and Christ the cross, but one day that same Christ will rise up and split history into A.D. and B.C. so that even the name, the life of Caesar must be dated by his name. There is something in this universe which justifies Carlyle in saying: "No lie can live forever." There is something in this universe which justifies William Cullen Bryant in saying: "Truth crushed to earth will rise again." There is something in this universe which justifies Russell Lowell in saying:

Truth forever on the scaffold, Wrong forever on the throne. Yet that scaffold sways the future, And behind the dim unknown Stands God within the shadow, Keeping watch above His own.

Go out with that faith today. Go back to your homes in the Southland to that faith, with that faith today. Go back to Philadelphia, to New York, to Detroit and Chicago with that faith today, that the universe is on our side in the struggle. Stand up for justice. Sometimes it gets hard, but it is always difficult to get out of Egypt, for the Red Sea always stands before you with discouraging dimensions. And even after you've crossed the Red Sea, you have to move through a wilderness with prodigious hilltops of evil and gigantic mountains of opposition. But I say to you this afternoon: Keep moving. Let nothing slow you up. Move on with dignity and honor and respectability.

I realize that it will cause restless nights sometimes. It might cause losing a job; it will cause suffering and sacrifice. It might even cause physical death for some. But if physical death is the price that some must pay to free their children from a permanent life of psychological death, then nothing can be more Christian. Keep going today. Keep moving amid every obstacle. Keep moving amid every mountain of opposition. If you will do that with dignity, when the history books are written in the future, the historians will have to look back and say, "There lived a great people. A people with 'fleecy locks and black complexion,' but a people who injected new meaning into the veins of civilization.; a people which stood up with dignity and honor and saved Western civilization in her darkest hour; a people that gave new integrity and a new dimension of love to our civilization." When that happens, the morning stars will sing together, and the sons of God will shout for joy. *(end of speech)*

As I said Sunday at the end of the service, "We're not there yet." The specter of white supremacy looms over our entire country and our history. Those of us who are white are only now beginning to learn the whole truth of that, and there is still plenty of denial, even among good people. Let's commit ourselves to learning more during this season, open to having our minds changed by God. May Dr. King's words inspire us on the way to "keep moving."

Worship at Ferndale First

February doesn't have many special Sundays, but during this time of winter our worship will be enhanced by reflections from Black History, with an opportunity to be inspired each week. Thanks to Dot Carter and others who will be assisting her in preparing for these Moments in Black History. In addition, our annual Teddy Bear Sunday (thanks to the UMW, the Lenaways, and other friends) will certainly enliven the month and bring a ray of sunshine into our lives and the lives of others. God could surprise us in February. See you in church!

- Feb. 2 4th Sunday after Epiphany; brings us to grapple with some familiar yet troubling words from what we call The Sermon on the Mount. We know these words as The Beatitudes, Jesus' teaching on what it really means to be "blessed" in this world. Message: Of Beatitudes and Fleas, Matthew 5.1–12. Holy Communion and Anointing with Oil will be offered.
- Feb. 9 5th Sunday after Epiphany; sometimes even God's people have to rethink what God wants of them. Occasionally we even get it wrong. That happened in Isai-ah's day and sometimes in our own. How can we be sure we get it right? Message: God in the Streets, Isaiah 581.1–12. This is also Teddy Bear Sunday, so be prepared to bring in new stuffed animals for children without parents. (Also Scouting Ministries Sunday in some UMCs. If we have scouts who would like to come in uniform, that's cool.)
- Feb. 16 6th Sunday after Epiphany; Jesus started from what most people considered to be the wise and prudent truth of the world, and then he said, "... but I say to you." Why did he have to be so picky and contrary? Message: *But Jesus Says*,, Matthew 5.21–37.
- Feb. 23 Transfiguration Sunday; when Jesus was "transfigured," a vision of light seen by only three of his disciples, the event, maybe the high point of his earthly ministry, connected him with a bigger story that God is telling in the world. What can it reveal shining for us? Message: *Enough Light for Now*, Matthew 17.1–9, Exodus 24.12–18, 2 Peter 1.16–21.
- Feb. 26 Ash Wednesday Service, 7:00 p.m. a service of penitence with the Imposition of Ashes that is the beginning of the season of Lent. It's important for those of us who take the Lenten journey to the cross seriously to begin this period of soul-searching and reflection with a quiet and thoughtful service. (For those who may not be able to attend that evening, there will be "drive through" Imposition of Ashes at St. Paul UMC on 8 Mile from 8–10 a.m.)

Who would you like to invite to worship with you next Sunday? (65–85% of all people who attend a church for the first time come because *they were invited* by a friend, neighbor, co-worker or relative.)



Giving and Living

In her new book <u>Grateful</u>, Diana Butler Bass traces her evolution from being a self-described ungrateful person to discovering the power of gratitude to change her own life and then, after research, a new awareness that as a Christian and citizen, gratitude could change the world.

... I'm coming away from her book with two ideas that bear repeating, not just for me personally, but for us as stewardship leaders, too. The first is rooted in history. Dr. Bass unpacks a concept of gratitude (and generosity), the Western version, most clearly practiced in the structure of the Roman Empire. She attaches the phrase *quid pro quo* to this understanding because there was an expectation that the generosity of the emperor was to be returned...

Does this feel familiar to you? If you are the beneficiary of someone's generosity, do you feel an obligation to "return the favor" even if it's just in the form of effusive thanks? If you are the benefactor, do you recognize an expectation in yourself that your beneficiary should be particularly attentive to you for your graciousness?

Unfortunately, this makes generosity transactional, consumeristic. Dr. Bass proposes that our faith invites us into a different way of being together. She suggests we think *pro bono*, a system where everyone is on par with everyone else, and we each share from our abundance, peer to peer...

One of the challenges of modern, middle class, privileged life is that we can so easily lose track of the tailwinds that help us in ways we may not even register. Our neurological predispositions lead us to pay more attention to the headwinds that create friction in our lives. This was biologically helpful to the survival of our ancestors, but it dampens our ability to be grateful for the "blessings" we receive daily, often in very small but persistent ways.

If we exclude or downsize in our conversation and consciousness the beauty of the generosity that surrounds us, it's not a far stretch to see that it will be harder to be generous and grateful in our daily lives.

What is that beauty? The miracle of breathing comes to mind, along with the flow of the seasons, the joy of being together with loved ones, the bond of sharing stories of faith in community, and the wonder of gathering for a simple meal of remembrance and hope in worship.

All of these things are quite miraculous when you stop and think about it (God's largess!).

We try to have enough on hand to be able to meet one major need while keeping a supply of gift cards and bus passes for those with smaller needs. Currently the fund is low and we have given out all of our gift cards.

29 Leaders/Events/Facts to honor this Black History Month; one for every day of February

1. Black History Month began as Negro History Week.

2. Stevie Wonder helped make Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday a national holiday with the assistance of special lyrics from his "Happy Birthday" song.

3. The dance form of stepping originated in Africa. The African gumboot dance is credited as being stepping's biggest influence.

4. In 2008, Usain Bolt became the first man to win three world records at a single Olympics event.

5. The Black Panther character first appeared in comics in 1966.

6. A full-time nurse named Marie Van Brittan Brown invented the first home security system.

7. Countries like the United Kingdom and the Netherlands celebrate Black History Month in October.

8. One of the most prominent doctors of his time, Dr. Charles Drew created the first major blood banks, blood plasma programs and bloodmobiles.

9. The Black Panthers launched programs such as free dental care, free breakfast, and drama classes in underserved black communities.

10. Lisa Gelobter invented the Gif. Thank her for making your tweets so funny!

11. Lincoln University in Pennsylvania became the first degree-granting institution of higher education for African Americans. It paved the way for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs).

12. Cathay Williams became the first and only female Buffalo soldier in 1866. She would pose as a male for two years until a doctor discovered that she was a woman, which led to her immediate discharge.

13. The year 2019 marks 400 years since the first documented Africans arrived in the United States via Point Comfort, Virginia.

14. John Mercer Langston became the first African American lawyer in the United States when he passed the bar in 1854. He's also the great-uncle of famed Harlem Renaissance poet Langston Hughes.

15. Hiram Rhodes Revels became the first African American person elected to the U.S. Senate. She served from February 1870 to March 1871.

16. Elijah McCoy is regarded as one of the most prominent black inventors ever. He's credited for inventing over 50 devices in his career, including a "lubricating cup," which automatically dripped oil when needed.

17. Mathematician and scientist Benjamin Banneker is credited for designing the layout of Washington, D.C.

18. Politician and educator Shirley Chisholm survived three assassination attempts during her campaign for the Democratic nomination for the United States presidency in 1972.

19. The largest women's organization is the National Council of Negro Women, which was founded by educator and political leader Mary McLeod Bethune.

20. Xavier University, a historically black college in Louisiana, has one of the highest success rates in the country for getting their graduates into medical school.

21. Thomas L. Jennings (1791-1859) was the first African American person to receive a patent in the U.S.

22. Allensworth is the only California community to be founded, financed and governed by African Americans. Created by Allen Allensworth in 1908, the town was built with the intention of establishing a self-sufficient, all-black city where African Americans could live their lives free of racial discrimination.

23. Halle Berry was the first African American to win an Academy award for Best Actress for her role in *Monster's Ball*.

24. Aretha Franklin was not only the first African American woman inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, but the first woman, period.

25. Hattie McDaniel, the first African American to win an Oscar, was not allowed to attend the national premiere of *Gone With The Wind*, the film featuring her award-winning performance, because she was black.

26. Nat King Cole was the first African American to reach #1 on the Billboard charts and the first African American to host his own television show.
